Black River

The three forks of the Black rise virtually within the shadow of the highest point in the state, Taum Sauk Mountain, and join near Lesterville to flow quickly toward the lowest section of the state. The upper Black is exceptionally clear and has enough feeder springs to produce some good smallmouth bass fishing. Below Clearwater Lake, the river moves more slowly and is less clear but is still a good float-fishing stream. Some of the most beautiful scenery in Missouri is to be found in the upper reaches of the Black. This includes several shut-ins, where the stream runs through jumbled rocks and potholes in gorge-like valleys. One such area open to the public is Johnson's Shut-ins State Park (DNR) on the East Fork. Shut-in Creek, a tributary of the East Fork, has a section which drops 70 feet per mile, but these upper shut-ins of the Black are not floatable. Mill Creek is the best starting point during normal or low-water levels. Good camping areas are located at Clearwater Dam and Markham Springs Recreation Area west of Williamsville.





- 0.0 Centerville Access, on left, at Hwy. 21 Bridge above Centerville on West Fork. High-water run only. Gravel bar. No ramp.
- 1.5 Reeds Spring on right. Adds considerable amount
- 8.4 Junction with Middle Fork. Middle Fork can be run only in spring or high water. Gradient — 11.1.
- 9.6 Junction with East Fork. A high-water run only, and quite short. Access below Taum Sauk dam. Gradient — 16.
- Peola Road Bridge. 10.3
- 10.7 Mill Creek on left.
- 12.2 Lesterville Access on left. Off Hwy. 21, to Peola Road to County Road 364. In low water, canoes/ kayaks may need to be carried 1/3 mile.

- 79.1 Hilliard Access on left at Route W. River flattens from here on.
- 81.3 Railroad bridge.
